Easter Message

My dear friends,

Last Sunday was the fifth Sunday of Lent, the clocks also went forward by one hour and we all lost an hour of valuable sleep. But it was also the official beginning of spring and Easter is only a few days away. Like Christmas Easter is celebrated widely around the world but unfortunately for many is more about the love of all things chocolate than its real meaning.

Easter Week or Holy week commemorates Jesus's journey to the cross, His suffering, his death and resurrection. Good Friday is remembered as the day Jesus was crucified on the cross and reminds us of the darkness that filled the skies when he died. A meeting of the Parish Council was held on 6th March.

Present were J. Hume chair, four councillors, clerk, Babergh DC, internal auditor and a member of the public for part of the meeting.

The member of the public was asked to speak. He is the owner of Curtis Farm where concerns were raised about works being carried out without planning permission. He reassured the council that they had been working with Babergh and the heritage officer and all was correct.

Apologies were received from one councillor and Suffolk County Councillor.

Co-option: There is still a vacancy on the council although term of office would only run until May. Elections are taking place on the 4th May. All electors will need photographic identification in order to vote.

Accept members declaration of interest. One councillor declared an interest in the Leys House application.

Reports: County Councillor **Robert Lindsay** said the council are waiving the fee for road closures for those organising Coronation street parties. The Highways maintenance contract has been awarded to Milestone who will be responsible for maintenance of roads, pavements, rights of way, drainage, hedge trimming, construction of new road schemes, snow clearing and gritting. Also reported on was the Fire and Rescue services new risk management plan and the county budget.

District councillor **Leigh Jamieson** reported on Housing: a number of properties in Babergh were found to be failing Health and Safety compliance. Changes are to be made. He also reported funding for a single depot, the plan is to close the aging sites and have one single depot for waste services, building services and repair teams. Also in his report was budget news, the proposed Solar farm at Burstall/Flowton and May elections.

Parish time: The postman is retiring, he will be missed. It will be left to individuals how they wish to thank him. An increase in litter was reported particularly on the main roads. The current editor of the newsletter is stepping down.

Minutes were confirmed and signed as correct.

Clerk's report: The clerk had been in contact with the school, the eco committee were keen to join in the spring litter collection near the school. The clerk regularly updates the Kersey Google calendar on the website with details of events being organised.

Correspondence: All had been circulated to councillors, one item to note was Highways would be completing pre-surface dressing repairs to roads in Kersey Tye, Uplands and Williams Green areas between 15th March and 12th April. Diversions will be put in place as necessary.

Finance: Financial statement showing balances, receipts and payments were approved.

Planning: Progress – The clerk had spoken to the enforcement officer at Babergh about Curtis Farm. After investigation they found no case for action. All works had planning permission. The chicken run, coop and vegetable cage are not considered to be in the cartilage of the listed building. They are not large for their surroundings and they are the sort of thing you would expect in farmhouse surrounds and no action is to be taken.

Manor Farm, Williams Green. Erection of single storey rear extension. Councillors supported this application.

One councillor left the meeting.

Leys House, Church Hill. Application for planning permission without compliance of conditions. Councillors found this a difficult application to consider since the development had taken place. It was not in accordance with planning permission which was granted. The Parish Council do not want this to set a precedent for future non-compliance by other property owners. They agreed neither to support or object but to bring to the attention of the planning department their concerns. The size of the terrace is quite large, trees may have been removed and there is possible cont./

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noise nuisance with the use of a hot tub which does not appear on the original plans.

The councillor re-joined the meeting.

Site visits were stopped during Covid. It was agreed that the need for a site visit would be considered on a case to case basis. There are times when a visit can provide a better understanding of the development than from documents.

Footpath Working Group: A report was received from Kevin Pratt. The paths under contract with Suffolk County Council had surface clearance work carried out twice last year. It is hoped to hold a meeting for volunteers at the end of March. The priority being that all paths have an allocated volunteer ahead of the new mowing season. The risk assessment has been updated and given to all volunteers. Kevin is going to stand down as chair in April. He thanked the volunteers for their work and support over the years. The council wished to pass on their thanks to Kevin for his excellent work as chair and that of all the volunteers for keeping the footpaths in Kersey in such a good condition.

KCPC Working Group: A quarterly inspection will be carried out this month and mowing rota and maintenance morning arrangements made.

Consider progress on whether Kersey should have a Village Emergency Telephone System. To date not enough volunteers have come forward for the system to operate. The defibrillator continues to be available at The Bell for use in an emergency. There is also another public access defibrillator at Kersey Mill.

Consider a Coronation Celebration for Kersey. It was suggested that a smaller event rather than a street party be held to celebrate this historic milestone. The Bell would like to get involved. It was agreed to hold a community picnic on The Glebe with everyone bringing their own picnic and seats. To be held on 7th May 12.00.

Review effectiveness of internal audit and internal control systems. The council reviewed and approved their internal control systems and also went through the review of effectiveness. The internal auditor said she would be happy to continue as auditor.

Review Risk Management Policy, Business Risk Register and risk assessments.

The council reviewed the Risk Management Policy, no changes were made to this policy. The council resolved to approve the updated risk assessments. These documents show there is effective management of risks facing the council.

Consider progress on the Parish Review and creating a public consultation questionnaire. The Babergh community's team are able to support this review but it will be delayed until after the election.

Agree a content for newsletter "Pride in our Parish" An article to be written thinking about our postman who is retiring. Also, a thank you to the playground, footpath and KVG volunteers for all their work during the year.

Training: SALC continues to offer online training. The clerk had attended a networking session and an election briefing.

AOB: The road sign at Williams Green has been reinstated following repairs. There had been very little interest in a Parish email update system, so it will not be pursued at this stage. The clerk confirmed footpath maps are available in the church. The Bell could possibly be another outlet.

The Annual Parish Assembly will be held on 17th April. This is an open meeting for all residents. Annual reports will be received from all village organisations.

FARMING NOTES

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Arable

After Ryan's rugby injury when he sustained a badly broken leg, we progressed with the arable work surprisingly well for the rest of February, completing the first dose of granular nitrogen and all of the base fertiliser. Since then however we have fallen badly behind – not due to staff shortages but the weather! February was one of the driest on record and March has been the opposite. There is now a backlog of herbicide application to the ploughed ground awaiting sugar beet, fungicide to the earlier cereal crops, secondary nitrogen application to the same and to the grass, to say nothing of the need to get the sugar beet land cultivated and drilled. The weather has simply been against us, and does not look very promising for the next week or so.

I do however have some good news. Ryan is making good progress after a slow and painful start and is now able to carefully move around on crutches but will not be able to drive for a while, so physical work is still out of the question. We wish him well. I am pleased to say that we have procured the services of Adam Sargeant who is doing a 3 day-a-week Agricultural Engineering course at Otley College and working for us in between. So far he has made very good progress and we hope to keep him on permanently, so that on Ryan's return I will be able to slowly take a back seat. As my eldest son Laurence has decided to follow his heart and leave farm work to further his building career, this all fits together well.

Other news: I heard very recently of the theft of some small farm equipment from a neighbouring parish, so vigilance around garden sheds and outbuildings is recommended, and number plates of any suspicious vehicles noted and passed to the Rural Policing Team.

Livestock

Lambing has been progressing a little more slowly than usual. This is because one of the stock rams let us down in the autumn. We use raddle paint on the rams so that we can see which ewes have been mated, once most of the ewes are marked we change the colour of the raddle, if the ram serves many ewes on a second cycle it suggests that there is a problem with his fertility. In this case I removed the dud ram and put in another one which resulted in the ewes getting in lamb, but rather than lasting four weeks lambing may drag on for six. The good news here is that there will be some nice young lambs for people to see at our open day on 2nd April.

Calving is also progressing and I hope to be turning out both sheep and cattle to grass fairly soon.

We were delighted recently when we did an embryo transfer flush on Royale, our most valuable British Blue heifer – she yielded nine embryos. These were implanted fresh into waiting surrogate mums so we hope to see several progeny from her in December. You could say it was a Royale flush!

BABERGH DISTRICT COUNCIL

Budget News

The current economic situation has put pressure on the Council to deliver a balanced budget this year. Like everyone the Council has been affected by the increase in inflation and other pressures that are driving the cost of living crisis. The net cost of delivering services is set to increase by almost 20% this year, from £10.43m in 2022/3 to £12.45m in 2023/24, while the cost of running and maintaining the council's housing stock has already increased by 50%.

It was a difficult decision to agree to this year's budget because while the Council has been able to use savings and investments to balance the books, next year's budget will see a 2.99% increase to the district council's share of council tax – the equivalent of an extra \pounds 5.30 a year, or 10p a week for residents in a Band D property. There will also be increases from county and the Police and Crime Commissioner that will be larger.

Council tenants will also see a 7% increase in rents to try to keep pace with increased costs and ensure necessary investment in repairs and maintenance across the council's social housing stock. This will mean average weekly social rent increasing by $\pounds 6.68$ a week from $\pounds 95.47$ to $\pounds 102.15$. For affordable housing, weekly rents would increase by $\pounds 9.41$ from $\pounds 134.39$ to $\pounds 143.80$.

Although the books were balanced this year, the outlook for the forthcoming years is much more challenging. At the moment significant deficits are predicted and a lot of work needs to be done to find ways of generating sufficient income. However, a lot has happened in the last twelve months and a lot could happen before next years budget is produced.

Housing

Following an in-depth review of the Council's Building Services the Council have self-referred themselves to the regulator for social housing. A number of properties were found to be failing Health & Safety compliance.

Detailed investigations showed that some of homes were not compliant, and urgent action is being undertaken to resolve the issues.

In Babergh, of 3,502 properties

- 116 did not have an up-to-date electrical safety report.
- Seventy-two were overdue a gas safety inspection.
- Thirty-two were overdue asbestos re-inspection surveys.

A Regulatory Notice was issued for this breach of compliance. This means it will now monitor Babergh and Mid Suffolk Councils and will meet with the Council regularly to ensure the necessary changes are made.

May Elections

The May elections will be the first where voters will be required to produce photo ID at the polling station. Many forms of ID can be used and even out of date driving licences and passports will be accepted as long as the picture is clear.
