ST. MARY'S CHURCH

A message from the new Rector:

Dear Friends,

My wife Angela and I have now been living in Elmsett only a couple of weeks but we feel very much "at home" here. I am very much looking forward to getting to know as many people as possible in Kersey. So that you can get to know me, here are a few lines about me and my family.

I answer to either Geoff or Geoffrey (the latter usually when being told off).

I grew up in Streatham, South London, the 5th generation to have lived in the Streatham area. I left school and took an apprenticeship with a firm of stonemasons working at Westminster Abbey. At the Abbey I ended up working in the drawing office producing full size drawings of parts of the building. In addition, I worked on a number of other London landmark buildings including Parliament itself.

In 1989 I was 'volunteered' to work in the Church in Uruguay, originally intending to stay for six months, but in the end, I spent 12 years there. Whilst in Uruguay I was offered the opportunity to do theological training in Montevideo and was ordained as a deacon in the Anglican Cathedral in Montevideo in 1994 and a priest in 1996.

I spent the last few years in the north of Uruguay where I had a number of churches to look after. One of these was in Fray Bentos, home of the Corned Beef factory. The factory is still there and is now a museum. You can still see the ramp where the cattle went in and the loading bay at the other end where the tins of corned beef were dispatched for shipping.

I came back to the UK in 2001 to work as vicar to seven parishes on the Wilford Peninsula. In 2007 I moved to Holbrook where I had five parishes, and then moved to take on a group of parishes in the Cotswolds.

My wife, Angela has worked as a teaching assistant in early years for nearly 10 years now. Both Angela and I have ties with Suffolk: My own family has had connections with Suffolk since the 1970's in the Woodbridge area, with my parents moving to Woodbridge for their retirement. Angela has family coming from Charsfield and Boyton. We have 2 children (they are my step children) Charles 24, and Nicola 22. Charles lives in South London and is doing PhD research into something called "Linea Temporal Logic" — something to do with computer science. Nicola lives most of the time in Bulgaria where she works for a charity that rescues street dogs and cats and finds them new homes in the UK.

I hope you will find me open and friendly and happy to make time to be with people regardless if you want to talk about religion, the ups and downs of ITFC or just the weather.

FARMING NOTES

Much has taken place since I last wrote. We began harvest 2023 on 10 July and had completed the winter barley by 21 July after a couple of stops for rain. The barley yield was pleasingly good after such a dry period in May and June, but the all-important quality for malting was a little disappointing. What let us down this year was screenings and kernel size. The malting specification sets out the following criteria: Nitrogen content 1.75% max, moisture 14.5%max. Ours was within these tolerances. Screenings (thin grain) 2% max, here we dressed the grain hard in the combine but were still outside this spec, ours was up to 7% screenings. Retention 85% min, this is a guide to the kernel size and measures the % of grain retained on a 2.5mm sieve and we were running between 70 and 85% retention. All of the aforementioned means that although our winter barley was accepted for malting there would be some serious reductions from the contracted price. Irritating, but not too serious until you realise that this years contract price was £135 down on last year's, when there were no reductions at all! Suddenly you can see that on 650 tons of produce this becomes quite worrying. However, as all of the above is totally dictated by the vagaries of our weather we don't loose too much sleep as we know there was nothing more we could have done to improve the situation!

Brother Chris busied himself moving the 1200 big round bales of winter barley straw to its winter storage sheds to make way for drilling oil seed rape (OSR), while we began the spring barley harvest on 1 August and finished it within a couple of days. Here the yield was not great but the quality was all within spec. and it was sold and delivered straight away. It was good to see Jimmy come out of retirement to spend a couple of days baling the spring barley straw into two thousand small bales, the carting and hand stacking of which further added to Chris and Sarah's workload!

The wheat harvest began in earnest on 8 August and we were extra busy for the next 8 days with Ryan and Adam working late into the night to take advantage of the fine weather until we finished by the end of play on 16 August. Well done them! This just left the winter beans, which were finally ready to cut on 21 August, after which the harvest was finally finished – not a bad run and, dare I say it, no breakdowns! Between times we had sent all of the winter barley away in lorries to the maltsters near Chelmsford and 319 tons (11 lorry loads) of wheat to Camgrain at Linton near Cambridge. The remaining 500 tonnes of wheat is stored in our grain store for sale later in the year. In between all that we managed to sow 150 acres of OSR in early August, which has germinated and grown extremely well, notwithstanding attacks from slugs and flea beetles.

The wheat yields were quite good and the quality is satisfactory, but not perfect. The specification for bread making wheat (milling wheat) is 13% protein and this year ours is hovering around the 12.5% mark, so we will achieve most of the premium on offer for milling. This now takes us to the busiest period when we have to cultivate all the remaining ground in preparation for sowing for harvest 2024 and we will have gone full circle once again!

PARISH COUNCIL

A Parish Council meeting was held on the 3rd July. Chair: John Hume.

All other councillors were present plus clerk, Leigh Jamieson (BDC) and a member of the public for part of the meeting.

Apologies were received from Robert Lindsay (SCC) and one member of the public.

Co-option to fill vacancy on the council. An expression of interest had been received by one applicant. Reasons for wanting to become a councillor were given. Liz Bostock was then co-opted to the Parish Council.

Reports:

Robert Lindsay Suffolk County Councillor said he had asked highways when the verges would be cut and to make sure they cut the 'No through roads'. If cutting is delayed he wanted to ensure that the contractors were not paid for verges if they had been done by farmers. He gave an update on the speed limits in Stone Street and Union Hill, library funding, coping with growing water demand, potholes and Bildeston food bank.

Leigh Jamieson Babergh District Councillor spoke about the council's overview and scrutiny work plan, planning, administration update and Babergh and Mid Suffolk plans to install 28 new electric vehicle charging points in car parks this year. Magdalen Road in Hadleigh will be one of those to benefit.

Receive feedback from the recent Bell Inn beer festival. The chair started by thanking the new directors of The Bell for reviving the pub, which has brought life back to the village. The feedback from residents had been mainly positive regarding the beer festival. It had been a great family event. The only concern related to parking congestion. A director of the Bell was present and said they were pleased how the event had gone and had learnt lessons for future events. They were pleased with the support given by the local community.

Planning: The Bell Inn. Works to fell Group of conifers. The Bell director said they had not submitted the application. It seems ownership of the trees is unclear. The parish council agreed they could not comment on the application but would consider it at a later date if resubmitted with the correct information.

Minutes of previous meeting was confirmed and signed as correct.

Clerk's report: All reports and accounts have been published on the website and notice board as required. Confirmation has been received via our District Councillor that all the new residential dwellings built in Kersey in the last few years were exempt from CIL charging. The defibrillator is ready should it be needed. Verge cutting is overdue. Our County Councillor has been asked to find out when they will be cut and to remind highways to cut the verges on the 'No through roads'.

Correspondence:

All correspondence had been circulated to councillors.

The cycling Tour of Britain will pass along the A1141 near Kersey Mill on 7 September. Also noted was National Grid Bramford to Twinstead Reinforcement project has now moved to next stage. National Grid has launched a new consultation on proposed route of pylons for Norwich to Tilbury and Digital Champions. Communities Together East Anglia offer a Digital workshop project to improve digital skills access.

PARISH COUNCIL (cont.)

Finance:

All financial items had been circulated and approved. The council were grateful to the Lewis Mowles Trust who had paid for the new seat on Church Walk and given £1,000 to the KCPC working group.

Planning - Progress:

Land to rear of 1-6 The Street. Councillors did not wish to comment further on these updated plans.

Boutells. Tree works. Babergh had no objections.

Corner House. Reconstruction of chimney stack. Babergh granted permission.

Bridge House. Increase the footprint of proposed extension and alterations to garage window. Erection of one and half storey link extension and garage conversion, reinstatement of a staircase and demolition of internal wall. Babergh had granted permission.

Applications to consider. River House. Rebuild central chimney stack. Councillors fully supported this.

Outbuilding at Curtis Farm. Remedial works in respect of oil contamination of the soil and building fabric caused by damaged oil tank. Councillors fully support this application.

Footpath Working Group:

No issues had been reported regarding the footpaths . The new equipment has been purchased and is working well.

KCPC Working Group:

The mowing rota is working well. The quarterly inspection found a few minor defects, these have been rectified. It is planned to top up the rubber chips under the swings.

Replacement gate for The Glebe. The gate and gateposts at the playing field need replacing.

Replacement of historic street signs on Church Hill. Two signs have been purchased.

Installation of second defibrillator to cover outlying hamlets of Kersey.

Three donations have been offered towards this. It was agreed to try to get the defibrillator purchased by September.

Review of Parish Council Asset Register: The assets have all been inspected, some need small repairs done. All timber assets need to be treated with a clear preservative then teak oil.

Parish Review:

No progress at present.

Consider the evolution of the Covid-19 support group into a general community support group. All the volunteers had been contacted and the general agreement was that a permanent emergency support group was a good idea. The idea of combining this with a Community Digital Champion who would have training and knowledge to support residents who are not confident users to get online safely could also be considered. A meeting would be held later in the year.

PARISH COUNCIL (cont.)

Agree content for Pride in our Parish article: It was agreed to write an article thanking our volunteers for their support during the pandemic. The organisation spotlight will be the Forget me nots.

Training: Sessions are available for all new councillors.

Reports: Notes have been circulated from the SALC Babergh meeting.

AOB: Following the repair of the water leak In Kedges lane the road surface has not been satisfactorily repaired. Concern was raised about dirty water flooding across the road at The Forge which may be causing a health hazard. Issue to be investigated.

It was noted that the welcome letter for new residents does not require any updates. The Suffolk passenger interest group involved with trying to improve public transport provision is likely to fold. The school bus service is a registered service so could be used by members of the public.

Kersey Projects were congratulated on an excellent Open Gardens event.

Next meeting 4th September.

Full report can be found on the website.

An extra ordinary meeting of the Parish Council was held on 31 July.

Present were Chair John Hume, 5 councillors, clerk and one member of the public. **Apologies** were received from one councillor and a member of the public.

Minutes of previous meeting were confirmed and signed as correct.

Planning - Progress: Application had been withdrawn for works to fell group of conifer at The Bell. Babergh have discharged conditions for land to the rear of 1-6 The Street. Babergh have granted permission to rebuild chimney stack at River house.

Planning to be considered: Agricultural building, Water Lane. Proposal was to determine if prior approval is required for a change of use of agricultural buildings to dwelling house. Change of use to a two bedroom dwelling. The applicant outlined their plans to convert former agricultural building to dwelling. Councillors supported this application. If it is approved by Babergh the parish council would like a condition imposed that it is used as a permanent dwelling and not a holiday home.

AOB: The parish council have been asked to provide supporting information for a 40mph speed limit on the A1141. The poor state of road surface in Kedges lane has been marked for repair. A councillor had attended a Babergh Community Infrastructure Levy briefing. One councillor had attended a National grid consultation of the proposed pylons. The chair thanked the councillor who had fitted the replacement road signs. Concerns were raised about the number of vehicles near River House. Works are coming to an end so this issue should soon be resolved. Some refuse bins hadn't been collected. No meeting had been arranged as yet to discuss seating and lighting at front of The Bell. Concern was raised about lack of verge cutting.
