#### ST MARY'S CHURCH PCC - PUBLIC NOTICE

As everyone is aware our beautiful parish church is a grade 1\* listed building and all changes to the structure, the fabric and the artefacts within require approval from the Diocese and any interested third parties, such as Historic England, The Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings and indeed many others.

There is a list of many routine maintenance items that the Diocese allows the PCC to manage otherwise very little essential work would be completed. For everything else a Faculty must be submitted and a process followed which can take months or even years to conclude.

A Faculty for two projects has recently been supported by the Diocese and we are awaiting third party feedback which is due by the end of March. Following this will be a short period of public consultation, and Notices will appear in and around the church requesting feedback (positive and negative). Feedback can be anonymous and is made directly to the Diocese and not the PCC.

These two projects are the Shrine Installation and the new windows in the Sedilia. The PCC will include a detailed note alongside the official notice so that everyone has a good understanding of the background and rationale to each project. Any questions should be directed to Colin Grannell or Linda Newbigging in the first instance. An update will be provided at the APCM on 10th April in the Church at 7.30pm.

#### Dear Friends,

The other day in Hadleigh I saw something rare, more so than spotting a Dartford Warbler at Minsmere! It was a man smoking a pipe! Back in the day, pipe smoking was an everyday thing, from Sherlock Holmes to Harold Wilson or Tony Benn to Stephen Fry. My old foreman when I worked at Westminster Abbey had a pipe which he was either smoking or using as a pointing stick. On one occasion I was helping him build one of the flying buttresses and he asked me what the first thing was that he should do. Before I could answer he said: light my pipe and have a think! And that is what happened, we spent the next half hour sat on some stones discussing what we would do whilst he filled the air with clouds of smoke.

His advice stuck with me, not the pipe bit, but the bit about standing back and taking time to think things over. These days there are not many, if any flying buttresses that need rebuilding, but life does throw up situations when standing back and thinking things through is what is needed.

April is a time for personal reflection and growth, a good time to take a step back and reflect. As we witness the world around us bursting into life, we are reminded of our own potential for transformation and renewal. 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#### PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on the 4th March.

Present were John Hume chair, four other councillors, clerk, one member of the public plus County and District councillors for part of the meeting.

**Apologies** were received from one councillor with one absent.

**Declarations of Interest:** One councillor declared an interest in a planning application.

Minutes were confirmed and signed as correct.

#### **Public forum and reports:**

Suffolk County Councillor Robert Lindsay said he was pleased that Kersey and Semer councils had been able to match his funding for the 40mph limit on the A1141, his report also included the council budget, weed killing, Special Educational Needs failure and Suffolk Devolution.

*District Councillor* Leigh Jamieson's report included the Babergh budget, parking charge petition, loft insulation for Suffolk Homes and Tax premiums for empty and second homes.

**Parish time:** Concern was raised about the poor state of the road signs in the parish giving a poor impression to visitors. It was confirmed that if the signs are for safety issues Suffolk County Council has a legal duty to ensure they are legible. A resident will photograph the signs ready to send to SCC. The cobbles either side of The Splash are dangerous. This has been reported to SCC.

County and District councillors left the meeting plus the member of the public.

**Planning - progress:** Cherrywood, The Tye. Erection of detached garage/cart lodge and barn for storage of machinery. Babergh refused permission stating that the development would be contrary to the Joint Local Plan.

Little Manor. Tree works. Babergh did not wish to object.

To consider: Curtis Farm. Works to gable elevation. Parish councillors agreed to fully support this application as it will protect this historic building.

**Clerk's report:** Kersey school and their eco committee will carry out a litter collection around the school. The clerk will contact the KVG with updated risk assessment and a reminder to walk their routes before the spring growth. The Kersey community calendar on the website is regularly updated. The clerk has spent time with Semer Parish Council to secure funding for the A1141 speed limits. The clerk continues to report potholes via the reporting tool. Robert Lindsay had been in touch with Highways to question why some terrible potholes had not been repaired within the time frame. The reply was the wet weather had prevented them from being done. There had been a delay in fitting the Uplands defibrillator and in setting up the new Kersey Good Neighbour group. The defibrillator at The Bell is reported as active. An estimate had been received for the water depth marker at The Splash. This will be discussed at the next meeting.

All correspondence was noted.







#### PARISH COUNCIL (cont.)

**Finance:** A financial statement had been circulated to councillors for approval. All payments were approved. A councillor had checked the bank conciliation had been completed and they were correct.

**Footpath Working Group:** Some footpaths remain underwater. It is likely that the first cut will be difficult as many ruts have appeared. Fallen trees have been removed. SCC have replaced the footbridge which had been washed away. Thanks as always to the volunteers.

**KCPC:** The quarterly inspection was carried out with no major deficiencies. The swing seats have been removed until repair to the swing frame has been completed. Work is also needed on the slide castle and balance beam. Leigh Jamieson has kindly offered some money from his budget to put towards these works.

**Consider progress** with the Neighbourhood Priorities Statement. The Babergh officer is happy to support the Parish Council Working group at a meeting.

**Reviewed were** Effectiveness of Internal Audit and Internal control systems plus Risk Management policy, Business risk register, risk assessments and confirm compliance with Data Protection legislation.

**Agree content for Pride in our Parish:** This will inform residents that there will be a flood investigation carried out by SCC. Organisation spotlight for April will be the Tuesday Club.

**Training:** SALC continues to offer a variety of training sessions. The clerk had attended two networking sessions.

**Reports** from other meetings: Brett Valley Digibus. A councillor is part of a steering group investigating options for a new demand responsive bus service for rural villages. **AOB** for councillors. The chair had received a call from Suffolk Neighbourhood Watch group. The chair to find out more on the benefits of restarting again. All residents are able to follow Suffolk Police and receive Police connect messages. The information on how to connect is on the Parish website. Councillors still to visit The Bell about the outside lighting.

**The Annual Parish Assembly** is on the 15th April 7.30 followed by a Parish Council meeting if needed.

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#### **FARMING NOTES**

#### Arable

As is usual in the farming world this month's work has been dominated by the weather. Although we have had nearly a week of dry weather as I write, the ground is still wet from the huge amount of winter rain. We would normally have expected to be sowing our spring crops by now but we need another week of fine weather before the ploughed land will be dry enough. I have learnt to be patient as moving land that is not dry enough usually results in less than ideal sowing conditions, especially if we get rain immediately after disturbing the soil. The exception to the above is land that was planted with oil seed rape back in August 23. Because it was dry and firm when sown and the plant has grown vigorously and taken up a lot of water since sowing, the OSR land is able to bear the weight of large tractors. Just as well as our recently purchased fertiliser spreader needs to be used on a big tractor as it can carry at least 3 tons of fertiliser, and OSR being an early crop needs all of its nutrient in good time. We have run through it twice with nitrogen and once with Phosphate, Potash and a small amount of Sulphur and will need to apply the final dressing of nitrogen by the end of March.

While unable to get on the land we have been busy planting a new wood, to be known as Sampsons Wood, comprising approx. 500 trees of mixed variety. Prior to planting we coppiced a tall hedge to prevent shading and hopefully the two will grow up together happily. We have also coppiced another hedge in order to dig out the ditch beside it as part of our drainage maintenance plan. If left un-coppiced for too long, most hedges will become too tall and lose their vigour and the amount of cover that is ideal for wildlife, so although this looks destructive, it is necessary every 20 years or so in rotation.

#### Sheep

Lambing finished yesterday... Hooray! It has been a long (mild) wet winter and it will be lovely to be able to turn out the ewes with their lambs onto fresh spring grass as soon as ground conditions allow. Lambing actually went quite well with only the usual few frustrations: a few still born lambs; a couple of lambs laid on by their mothers and one or two sudden unexplained lamb deaths. All of that is to be expected and we are pleased with the number and quality of the lambs. Our month of social isolation is over, Sarah and I enjoyed visiting the pub for lunch on Sunday!

#### Cattle

Calving is also progressing with about 15 cows left to calve out of the 45 which produce at this time of year. The most recent batch of Pedigree British Blue calves, which were got by embryo transfer and born out of crossbred recipient mothers, are doing well with no losses and no C-sections required. This included three sets of twins — a result of the deliberate policy of implanting embryos in pairs. Twin calves are generally smaller but usually easily born and very active. Sometimes it is also possible to adopt a spare twin calf onto a cow which has lost a calf. Twinning

embryos also helps us to boost the number of bulls we are producing to sell to Cogent, something Cogent are keen on because at present they can't get enough of our bulls! In recent years we have been using hornless (polled) genetics in our commercial and pedigree cattle and it is now becoming very noticeable that I am saving a lot of time in not having to disbud as many calves. Dehorning or disbudding is quite hard work involving restraining the calf, injecting anaesthetic and removing the horn bud with a hot iron, it can be stressful to the calf and the operative! In the fullness of time polled pedigree bulls which we are producing here at Kersev will be bought by Cogent and their semen marketed to other farmers leading to huge savings in money, time and stress.



We are hoping for fine weather for our charity farm open day here at Bridges Farm on Easter Saturday – 30 March 11am to 3pm. We look forward to seeing some of you then.

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#### PRIDE IN OUR PARISH

#### **Flooding in Kersey**

Well, we certainly had a lot of rain this winter! Some gardens near the Splash flooded at least four times.

The most spectacular was the 'once in a hundred years' Storm Babet in October when five houses were flooded internally and several gardens inundated. This met the criteria for investigation by Suffolk County Council (SCC).

The investigation, in partnership with the local community, aims to:

- highlight possible causes of flooding
- identify options to reduce future flood risk and increase property resilience
- recommend actions by relevant organisations, landowners and homeowners.

Climate change seems to be causing an increase in extreme weather conditions. It is reassuring that this investigation is underway to determine what can be done to reduce the damage of future storms.

A problem is the scale of the recent floods in Suffolk. Kersey is only one of the 40 villages in the County that have been affected. It is expected that there could be up to 80 investigations and this will take two years to complete.

Investigations are prioritised based on the number of homes flooded. Debenham and Framlingham are at the top of the list, as shown on the SCC website "Storm Babet - Suffolk County Council".

In Kersey, we're at 31 out of 48, so we don't expect anything soon. Kersey Parish Council will join the review and report on the recommendations.
