COMMUNITY POLICING TEAM

Dear Kersey residents, a new policing model has been introduced by Suffolk Constabulary. There are now Community Policing Teams (CPT) who have responsibility for long term problem solving and engaging with the community. The area I will be responsible for includes the following parishes...

Aldham, Capel St. Mary, Elmsett, Hadleigh North, Hadleigh South, Higham, Holton St. Mary, Kersey, Layham, Wenham Magna, Wenham Parva, Nayland with Wissington, Nedging with Naughton, Polstead, Raydon, Semer, Shelley, Stoke by Nayland, Stratford St Mary and Whatfield.



I have help with my area from PCSO 3092 Jo Adams, we are based out of Hadleigh Police Station. Other officers, such as those on the Response Investigation Team (RIT) are responsible for dealing with most crime and emergency incidents reported to Suffolk Police.

My new role incorporates visiting schools, holding engagement events, identifying and tackling any ongoing issues, dealing with anti-social behaviour and some other specific matters. The new approach should mean you see police a bit more and gives me the flexibility to patrol around my area and target anything that is going on and hear from the public directly about any issues that need police attention.

When it comes to Kersey, it remains a typically very safe place (much like the rest of my area), with no recent crime reports. There have been some burglaries reported in surrounding areas though and these are not just isolated to the early hours of the morning either, with some occurring in the afternoon or evenings. If you are out, try to make it look like someone is home and consider getting CCTV, even if that is just a video doorbell of some kind. You can find good crime prevention advice on the Suffolk Police website — www.suffolk.police.uk . The website also has a map showing what crime and anti-social behaviour is happening around you, just click on the "Policing in your area" and choose "Hadleigh and Nayland" then view the crime map and zoom in on your home area.

Please consider following the Hadleigh Police Facebook and X (formerly Twitter) pages, as along with a colleague responsible for the east Babergh area, I post on there and will advertise where I will be for each of my monthly engagement events.

FARMING NOTES

Arable

I am glad to report that the final lift of sugar beet took place in December and that the resultant 1,400 tons of crop has been delivered to Bury beet factory, making 3,200 tons in all for the season. Although lower in sugar yield than we would have hoped, this has been an enormous crop and we have achieved an average yield of around 95 tons/hectare which equates to 38.5 tons/acre. This record yield is quite poignant as it will be our last for the foreseeable future. Those who know our farm will be aware of the difficulties this crop has brought us. As well as the damage the carting off the fields of these big yields has done to our land, there is the damage to gateways, farm tracks and roads to consider – to say nothing of the stress caused to all by the mud on the roads that we have all seen! I am happy to leave this crop to those farming on lighter/kinder land where these issued are less severe.

As well as the usual tasks we have been pre-occupied for much of January with a looming Health and Safety inspection on 5th February. There have been many updates in H&S rules since our last visit and we are being kept busy catching up. I look forward to reporting the results in future Farming Notes!

Livestock

Having just returned from a short but very enjoyable skiing holiday with Sarah and 3 of our 4 grown up children, attention now turns to the busiest time of the year on the livestock part of the farm. Thanks to Rob, Ryan and Adam for covering while we were away.

The main calving period is due to start in early February and lambing starts 2 weeks later. This year we will be aided by 3 new closed circuit cameras set up in the lambing and calving yards which will send real time video of what is going on to my phone and may help save lives. Their infra-red feature means that a decent picture is available even in total darkness.

Sheep

The ewes were ultrasound pregnancy scanned just after Christmas with pleasing results: 6 ewes were barren (these will be sold soon); 10 single lambs; 50 sets of twins and 8 sets of triplets. This gives an overall average of 1.81 lambs per ewe. In an ideal world all of the ewes would have twin lambs because singles (oversized) and triplets (lambing complications and small lambs) are usually what cause the most problems. It could be that 50 sets of twins from 74 ewes mated is as close as we will ever get to that.

Cattle

I am pleased to report that the results of our herd TB test which was done in December came back clear. Fortunately TB is not a big problem in this part of the country. Thankfully, the herd was also tested clear of Bovine Viral Diarrhoea (BVD) and Infectious Bovine Rhinotracheitis (IBR). One cow tested positive for Johnes disease – in order to maintain our high health status she has been isolated and will have to be culled soon. For the first time this year we also tested for Leptospirosis and Neospora which are less serious cattle diseases, as expected we found a handful of positive cases.

The ten or so pedigree calves which were due to be born in December duly arrived with no losses, although a couple had to be delivered by C-section. One of the emergency caesareans happened to be needed one Friday evening just when all of the vets were out on their Christmas jolly. The on-call vet did not seem to be too disappointed to be called away. Meanwhile a further six pedigree British Blue bulls have been supplied to the Cogent stud in Cheshire, if things go well we may achieve my slightly ambitious target of supplying 20 bulls to Cogent this calendar year.


