ST. MARY'S CHURCH

Dear Friends,

Some years back I was invited to join a friend to go and see Bob Dylan. My friend happened to have a spare ticket and thought I might like to go. Without hesitation I said "Yes". It seemed, at the time, an opportunity not to be missed, seeing the legendry Bard in concert. Sadly, the reality was a bit different, we were almost at the back of the stadium and to be honest the only reason I know Dylan was on stage was because everyone cheered when this tiny figure came on stage. From where we were it was like seeing an ant at 10 meters away. Then there was the sound system – put bluntly it was useless, couldn't really hear what he was singing. The only song that I picked up was "The times they are a-changing", and I only worked that out because everyone else was singing along. At least I can say I was there, and if it wasn't for my poor eyesight I can say I saw him (albeit vaguely) on stage.

The song was written as a deliberate attempt to create an anthem of change for the time – the mid 1960's. Politically, socially and in the world of music there was plenty of change going on.

It is suggested that one of the influences of the song "The times they are a-changing" was the book of Ecclesiastes which says: For everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven: and then lists "a time to..." and lists aspects of life that come our way. In a nutshell that is the philosophy of this reading: life is what it is — sometimes beautiful and sometime not so beautiful. But it goes deeper because it also reminds us that in all of this from a Christian perspective God is with us through all the many chances and changes, we face in life.

However, all of this brings me smoothly onto the subject that is on my mind. As of August, the times are a-changing, and the first Sunday of the month the service of Holy Communion will be at 11am rather than 9am. This means the first and second Sunday of the month the service in church will both be at 11am and then the 3rd Sunday will continue to be Evensong at 6:30 April to October at 4pm November to March.

FARMING NOTES

Arable

During the last month we have achieved everything that we planned and the ground had dried out as one would expect in the Spring. However, once again, the weather has caught us out with an amazing amount of rain in 24 hours as 40mm (over 1.5 inches) fell overnight on the 21 May. This is an extraordinary amount of rain to have in one go, and again shows that we must begin to expect the extremes that are being predicted. Some rain in early summer is extremely valuable for growing and filling crops but as I said to a friend yesterday, "it needs to know when to stop"! Just about the only thing that will benefit from limitless rain is our new plantation, Sampsons Wood that I had begun to water, but will no longer need to on the short term. All the crops are progressing well and a decision will be made shortly as to whether the milling wheat will need a little more nitrogen to boost the protein for bread making. Our wild bird covers and maize for game shooting would have been drilled this week but will now be delayed until the ground is dry enough. In the meantime, regular maintenance jobs will continue.

Sheep

It seems that we are only just out of lambing and calving and the show season is upon us. The first event was a carcass competition run by our local Suffolk Sheep Club. We entered both purebred Suffolk lambs and crossbreds which have to be sired by a Suffolk Ram. The lambs are delivered to an abattoir in the morning then after slaughter they are judged "on the hook". We like to enter lambs as it is always interesting to see the carcasses and to get feedback from the buyers. This year we were pleased to win the crossbred section and very pleased with the prices paid! The Hadleigh Show soon followed and again we were very happy to win one first and two second prizes with our sheep together with a nice silver plate for the best meat lambs (judged live this time). Sarah, Josie and I were all busy stewarding at the show so David on a return home from Liverpool was in charge of the showing. The show was a great success and we were also pleased to see that Kersey School won a prize for their trade stand.

Cattle

The warm weather and high rainfall has resulted in an abundance of grass which the cattle are enjoying, cows are producing lots of milk which the calves are benefitting from. This is the best time of year for cattle and by the middle of June the cows should be in peak condition and will stand every chance of getting back in calf for next year. We have a rising star in the form of Kersey Royale one of our pedigree British Blue heifers: Royale has two versions of the sought after polled (hornless) gene which we have been trying to breed into our pedigree herd. Consequently, she along with a couple of others form our team of embryo donor females which are flushed regularly for embryos. These are then implanted into crossbred recipient cows (surrogate mothers). Royale has proven very consistent

producing fertile embryos every time. The pregnancy rate for implanted embryos is about 50% so hopefully within a couple of years we will have quite a few more little Royales on the ground all of which will carry at least one version of the polled gene. Although embryo transfer is a relatively expensive procedure it can work to speed up genetic progress, left to natural breeding Royale would produce one or maybe two calves in the same time. This rapid progress is something which we and Cogent (our breeding partners) are very excited about.

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PRIDE IN OUR PARISH

I want to tell you about changes which will make your Parish Council more relevant and interesting. Our aim is to represent everyone in our Community and make it a great place to live, work, play and visit. This can't happen without your input. Since Covid, attendance by Parishioners at Parish Council meetings has dropped, so it is sometimes difficult to gauge what other opinions there are on topics. We want wider involvement and participation. An important part of the role of the Parish Council is ensuring that the legal, financial and governance issues are dealt with. This is now a necessary part of life for Parish Councils. Actually, we do an excellent job on it but understand not everyone wants to sit through all that stuff.

So, one of the recent changes we made is to put the Public Forum item early on in the Agenda, so if there are issues you wish to raise, these can be considered in the first few minutes of the Meeting.

More important though, is our decision to start work on a Neighbourhood Priorities Statement (NPS) for Kersey. We looked at Neighbourhood Plans but they were complicated, expensive and very time consuming for a small Parish like ours. The NPS is simpler and will define what Kersey residents think are the principal needs and views of the community. This will include a wide range of topics, including land development, housing, natural environment, the local economy, public spaces, social infrastructure, traffic, public transport, speeding and planning. When it comes to planning, Babergh District Council must have regard to our NPS.

There will have to be extensive consultation on putting this together and a steering group of David Butcher, Penny Calnan, Richard Walker and Sarah Partridge, has been set up to start the process, supported by Jo Wood of Babergh District Council. You will be hearing more from them shortly.

Kersey is our village, our Parish. The NPS is vitally important and will determine how Kersey will be for current and future generations. Please make sure you have your say.
